Should I have one photo or several on my dating profile? I've liked the look of someone but changed my mind after seeing one that was less flattering...

Some people like to add a vast selection they add action shots, photos of them on holiday, or even with their pets. This is all very well and good, but keep one thought in mind every time you add one: does it add value?

Each photo you upload will be judged carefully by the viewer. If it raises alarm bells for any reason whatsoever then they'll quickly move on to the next profile. However, if it's an interesting shot it might serve as a fantastic
